WHAT IS FIREWISE

Firewise USA, a national program created by the National Fire Protection Association, educates individuals on how to adapt to living in wildfire-prone communities. This initiative encourages neighbors to work together and take action now to prevent losses. The program emphasizes homeowner responsibility and provides the framework for education dissemination, community partnerships, and local actions that support community wildfire safety efforts.



WAI'EHU KOU MAUKA, 2024

Firewise USA encourages local community-based solutions for wildfire safety, with the goal of reducing home ignitions due to wildfires. The Firewise USA program is cosponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service, the U.S. Department of Interior, and the National Association of State Foresters.

HOMESTEAD COMMUNITIES

The Department of Hawaiian Home Lands fulfills Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalaniana'ole's vision of rehabilitating native Hawaiians by returning them to the land.

Established through the passage of the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act by U.S. Congress in 1921, the Hawaiian homesteading program, administered by DHHL, includes management of more than 200,000 acres of land statewide with the specific purpose of developing and delivering homesteading.

Only four of the department's homesteads are Firewise certified.
